EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The goals of this plan are to introduce students to civic engagement and assist them in developing their opinions of the democratic process. This action plan was built upon the plan presented in 2020, which served as the baseline and foundation for civic engagement action plans to follow. Over time, we will grow our partner base as many organizations, talents, and resources will be needed if we are to continually be successful in this mission. Our priority is our students. In all this, we will continue to be proactive forward thinkers and strategists.

Wor-Wic Community College leads in the enhancement of the quality of life for tri-county and tri-state (VA, MD, and DE) residents by implementing best practices to produce a world-class workforce and providing excellence in education and training through consistent professional and student development.

Wor-Wic is a comprehensive community college that enhances local economic growth by addressing the educational, training and workforce development needs of the residents of Worcester, Wicomico and Somerset counties in addition to the states of Virginia, Maryland and Delaware. The college serves a diverse student body through its high quality, affordable educational offerings and comprehensive support services designed to facilitate student goal completion.

Our efforts span over three counties and three states as the Office of Student Engagement is responsible for disseminating information to Virginia, Maryland, and Delaware, in addition to Wicomico, Worcester, and Somerset counties, which are in Maryland. The civic engagement team has performed wondrously and will continue along that same path over the next years.

According to the American Association of Colleges and Universities (Ehrlich, 2000), civic engagement is "working to make a difference in the civic life of our communities and developing the combination of knowledge, skills, values, and motivation to make that difference. In addition, civic engagement encompasses actions wherein individuals participate in activities of personal and public

concern that are both individually life enriching and socially beneficial to the community."

Wor-Wic Community College's commitment is to this work and to our communities, fostering strong collaborative relationships while promoting civic engagement. Our college and the Office of Student Engagement will continue to meet its civic engagement goals by executing every resource available to ensure that students and the local community can rely on this organization to present accurate information on the civic engagement process.

Wor-Wic's Civic Action Plan will be implemented using the collaborative efforts of the Office of Student Engagement, the college's sixteen (16) clubs and organizations, the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Community Priority Team, the College Council, the Administrative Council, the Department of Student Services et. al, and the Faculty Council. Each of these entities will provide support to the plan with the same motivation, rigor, and enthusiasm as they have over the past forty-seven (47) years of service to the tri-county communities and our campus being named a Voter Friendly Campus.

The mission of this plan is to provide our college's internal and external constituents with the knowledge they need to explore their political beliefs and enact their privilege and constitutional right to vote. This plan will engage the college's internal (students, faculty, administrators, staff) and external (tri-county and tri-state) community stakeholders by providing programs, workshops, and resources in the following areas:

• Voter Registration

- Goal Ensure that every person who is not registered can register at our campus voter registration tables (Voting for Victory Festival) with a benchmark of greater than 50% of eligible stakeholders registering.
- Goal To certify one faculty/staff member and one eligible student to become a certified election official.

• Voter Education

o **Goal** – Provide forums, workshops, webinars, videos, panel discussions, classroom lectures, and meetings to inform students of the importance of voting, absentee voting, and the electoral college with a benchmark of ten (10%) of the student body participating.

• Voter Engagement

• Goal – To enact activities such as Student Advocacy Day, Constitution Day, Democracy Day, Stroll to the Polls, Your Daily Voting Vitamins, debates, a forum on the restoration of voter rights, and election forums with a benchmark of ten (10%) of our students participating in these events.

Democracy Day

• Goal – To encourage students, faculty, staff, and community stakeholders to participate in workshops, webinars, panel discussions, forums, and activities (i.e., Voting for Victory Festival) to promote civic engagement and community building with a benchmark of ten (10%) of the college's stakeholders participating in these events.

• Electoral Enlightenment

Goal – To apprise citizens of the importance of voting through
 Lunch n Learn lectures on the Electoral College with a benchmark of
 three lectures with 25% of the college's stakeholders in attendance.

These goals will be established through the efforts of the Office of Student Engagement, which oversees the Student Government Association, the DEI Priority Team, and serves five other committees thereby promoting the works of this document. This document will be reviewed by the college's leadership and the deans of enrollment management and student services for clarity and credibility, being used to rollout the plan for the plan's success. The plan will be implemented by guidance of the Office of Student Engagement, the Student Government Association, the DEI Priority Team, faculty, students, and community stakeholders.

FIRST YEAR STUDENT VOTER PARTICIPATION

Information regarding voter registration and civic engagement is consistently before students, with regularly held events and activities. Students are strongly encouraged to participate in events such as Student Advocacy Day, Student Government Association elections, Constitution Day, and Democracy Day. The college's sixteen clubs and organizations have access to and utilize a voting platform to select organization officers. Additionally, each club is required to annually review their constitutions and by-laws, updating them as necessary. On average, Constitution Day garners 10 new voter registrations.
