This course is designed for law enforcement and public safety officers. This course addresses the "Run Hide Fight" response paradigm and guides non-traditional first responders in the various ways these methods can be employed. Because active threat incidents can occur anywhere, participants are encouraged to apply principles from this course to plans and procedures in their workplaces. The course covers the basic principles of the response paradigm as it pertains to response in the event of an active threat incident.

This course is intended for participants with a first responder background who wish to become certified NCBRT trainers. The course builds upon the direct delivery version by providing a review of module content, opportunities for reflection and discussion, and administrative guidance regarding teaching indirect delivery. As such, the course is intended to prepare prospective trainers to effectively teach an indirect delivery.

Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Describe the need for an effective response paradigm to combat active threat incidents.
- 2. Identify the principles of the "Run Hide Fight" response paradigm in the event of an active threat incident.
- 3. Identify the preparedness cycle with the "Run Hide Fight" response paradigm to improve the chances of surviving an active threat incident.
- 4. Demonstrate the "Run Hide Fight" response paradigm based on active threat incident characteristics.
- 5. Demonstrate the critical components of each module to prepare participants to become trainers.
- 6. Demonstrate knowledge of course goal, terminal and enabling objectives for each module, and the critical content from each module of "Surviving an Active Threat: Run Hide Fight."

This course is designed to meet requirements as mandated by the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions and to meet the annual in-service requirements.

Class Size: Restricted size, seating is limited.

Attendance: You must attend the entire class to receive in-service credit.

Dress Code:

To maintain a professional appearance, all in-service officers/staff must follow the prescribed dress code to be admitted to any training held at the Academy.
